

Experience the captivating sound of Fazioli Pianoforti, loved by many for their exceptional quality. Our Fazioli F308 is a true masterpiece, one of only seven in the country. This extraordinary instrument was introduced to us by our

co-founder, Raniero Tazzi, who fell in love with it at first touch.

Raniero's journey into the world of Fazioli pianos began through his friendship with the late Davide Lupattelli (1962-2023), a renowned Italian piano technician. The passion and dedication



of Paolo Fazioli, the engineer and pianist-founder, is truly remarkable. Each piano goes through meticulous examination, with no expenses spared on the materials. In fact, the same type of wood used by Antonio Stradivari for his legendary violins is used for the Fazioli soundboard.



Paolo Fazioli's continuous technological research keeps Fazioli Pianoforti at the forefront of piano engineering. The Fazioli sound philosophy is rooted in the Italian "bel canto" tradition, allowing artists to truly explore the instrument's singing quality, colors, and dynamics.

MINOR & MAJOR

In the wondrous world of classical music, two main characters love to play hide and seek with our emotions - the Major and the minor keys. Now, if you're thinking these are the keys to some ancient, magical kingdom, you're not entirely off track!

Let's imagine you're at a grand party. The Major key is that bubbly, outgoing person always surrounded by a crowd, making everyone laugh with delight. Think of a jovial holiday jingle like "Jingle Bells" in song terms. It's typically happy, bright, and uplifting.




One excellent example of music in a Major key is the lively "Rondo alla Turca" by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. It's in the key of A Major. The Rondo alla Turca, penned by Mozart, is a lively splash of musical energy that leaves listeners tapping their feet. Its catchy melodies, set in a Major key, reverberate with a sense of joy and vigor, embodying Mozart's unique ability to blend complexity and accessibility. Alla Turca, often remembered as the "Turkish March," carries an air of exoticism, a delightful homage

to the Turkish music popular in Mozart's time. It's a piece that sparkles with creativity, a shining example of Mozart's timeless genius.

On the other hand, the minor key is the moody poet in the corner of the room, captivating yet introspective. It's like the melancholic "Moonlight Sonata" by Beethoven. Beethoven's Moonlight Sonata, particularly its first movement, is an unforgettable melody that captures the heart and soul. It's like a gentle whisper in the night, told in c-sharp minor's somber yet captivating tones. The rhythm is steady and soothing as a lullaby, yet the deep minor key brings an undercurrent of melancholy. Despite this, the Moonlight Sonata is more than just a sad tune; it's a journey of emotions, beautifully crafted by Beethoven's genius. It's a piece of music that stays with you, echoing in your mind long after the last note has been played. Music in the minor key often has a more sorrowful or introspective tone. These kinds of pieces often create feelings of sorrow and longing.

So, when it comes to classical music, Major and minor keys are like two sides of the same coin. They bring contrast and give life to the piece by providing a balance between light and dark. Together, they create a fascinating landscape of emotions that keep us listening for more! - Raniero Tazzi

WHAT ARE THE OPUS NUMBERS?

Classical music commonly uses the term "Opus Number," abbreviated as Op.X No.Y. It's like an address for a composer's work. It's a way to keep things organized and identify their pieces, usually in chronological order.

Now, let's say you have two pieces: Sonata No. 2 Op. 35 and Sonata Op. 35 No. 2. At first glance, they may seem identical, but there's a subtle difference. Sonata No. 2 Op. 35 is the composer's second Sonata, the 35th piece they've published. On the other hand, Sonata Op. 35 No. 2 is the second Sonata within the 35th published set of multiple Sonatas by the composer. Tricky, isn't it?

Now, not all composers used opus numbers, especially those from the Baroque period and earlier. For these composers, their works are usually cataloged by other scholars. For instance, Bach's works are often denoted by "BWV" (Bach-Werke-Verzeichnis, German for "Bach Works Catalogue"), followed by a number. Likewise, Mozart's compositions are cataloged with



"K.," short for "Köchel," the musicologist who cataloged Mozart's works. Finally, let's discuss this slightly eerie term: "Opus Posthumous." It feels like it's straight out of a ghost story, right? Well, it's less haunting than it sounds. An "Opus Posthumous" is a work published after the composer's death. It's like the composer's final encore from beyond the grave — their last gift to the world of music.




So, the next time you see those cryptic numbers and letters beside classical music pieces, you'll know they're not some secret code but rather a fascinating glimpse into the composer's musical journey. - Raniero Tazzi


DID YOU KNOW...

... that at the age of 14, the prodigious Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart visited the Vatican, where he heard Gregorio Allegri (1582-1652) "Miserere, mei Deus" (1630) being performed. This was a piece of music so sacred that the Vatican forbade its removal or copying. However, after hearing the piece just twice, Mozart transcribed it entirely from memory, a feat considered nothing short of miraculous. When this was discovered, it caused quite a stir. Mozart and his father Leopold found themselves in a predicament with the



Church. Rather than punish the young prodigy, however, the Pope summoned Mozart and, impressed by his remarkable feat, absolved him of any wrongdoing. Quite a testament to his genius, don't you think? Scan code to hear the fantastic Allegri's "Miserere."

As a graduate of Reina Sofía School of Music, he studied there for more than a decade with Galina Eguiazarova, receiving from Her Majesty the Queen Sofía the prize for the Best Student of the Chair, and got his Masters in Piano from Mannes School of Music in New York City, where he spent 3 years under the guidance of Jerome Rose.

2022 has been an extraordinary turning point in his career, with more than 70 concerts worldwide, performing in venues such as Carnegie Hall in New York, the Suntory Hall in Tokyo, and the National Auditorium of Music in Madrid. In addition, he released his first album, "Chopin and His Master," produced by the artist and recorded at the Fazioli piano factory in Sacile (Italy). It includes works by Bach, Chopin, Liszt, and Scriabin. He recorded the repertoire developed during the 21/22 season. The album is available on digital platforms (Spotify, Amazon Music, and Deezer) and physically sold only in Japan (Nippon Arts).

Martín García García, who feels a sense of responsibility and service to humanity, reduces his challenges to each concert. No matter the size of the venue or audience, he understands there is deep content to offer to each person who has decided to come and listen to him.

Recent and forthcoming orchestral collaborations include the London Symphony, Chicago Symphony, Boston Symphony, Los Angeles Philharmonic, Seattle Symphony, Shanghai Symphony at the BBC Proms, amongst others. Conductors he collaborates with include Riccardo Muti, Mirga Gražinytė-Tyla, Marin Alsop, Vasily Petrenko, Sir Mark Elder, Thomas Dausgaard, and Martin Fröst.

Active as a recitalist, he is presented on stages including the Concertgebouw Amsterdam, Queen Elizabeth Hall London, Leipzig Gewandhaus, Elbphilharmonie Hamburg, San Francisco Davies Hall, BOZAR Brussels, Fondation Louis Vuitton Paris, 92nd St Y, Seoul Arts Centre, Warsaw Philharmonic, and Sala São Paulo. In 2024, he is appearing for the 6th consecutive year in recital at Wigmore Hall London.

Born in Massachusetts in 1997, Eric Lu first came to international attention as a Laureate of the 2015 Chopin International Competition in Warsaw aged just 17. He was also awarded the International German Piano Award in 2017, and Avery Fisher Career Grant in 2021. Eric was a BBC New Generation Artist from 2019-22. He is a graduate of the Curtis Institute of Music, studying with Robert McDonald and Jonathan Biss. He was also a pupil of Dang Thai Son, and has been mentored by Mitsuko Uchida and Imogen Cooper.



Clayton Stephenson, an American pianist, is renowned for his captivating stage presence, expressive power, and natural ease with the instrument. He has performed with notable orchestras such as the Calgary Philharmonic, Chicago Sinfonietta, Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra, Louisville Symphony Orchestra, Lansing Symphony Orchestra, and North Carolina Symphony Orchestra.

Clayton has given recitals at prestigious venues like the Phillips Collection Concert Series, Foundation Louis Vuitton Auditorium, Bad Kissinger Sommer Festival, BeethovenFest, Colour of Music Festival, Ravinia Festival, and Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall. He has been recognized through appearances on NPR, WUOL, and WQXR and his participation in the "GRAMMY® Salute to Classical Music" Concert at Carnegie's Stern Auditorium.

Clayton's musical journey began in New York City, where he started piano lessons at 7. By age 10, he was accepted into Juilliard's elite Pre-College program, studying with renowned teachers such as Matti Raekallio, Hung-Kuang Chen, and Ernest Barretta. Growing up, he was supported by community programs, including the 3rd Street Music School, the Young People's Choir, and the Juilliard Outreach Music Advancement Program.

Currently, Clayton is pursuing a bachelor's degree in economics and a master's degree in piano performance as part of the Harvard-NEC Dual Degree Program. His achievements include being the first Black finalist at the Van Cliburn International Piano Competition in 2022. He was also named a 2022 Gilmore Young Artist and a Young Scholar of the Lang Lang International Music Foundation. Additionally, he received a jury discretionary award at the 2015 Cliburn International Junior Piano Competition and Festival.

He has also served as Artist-in-Residency at Pianofest in the Hamptons since 2011. Konstantin's creativity extends to innovative artistic projects, including dance collaborations and piano compositions. He has premiered various ballets, such as "Encounters" and "Emily," and released piano miniatures during the COVID-19 lockdown. His solo violin composition, "Postcard from The Edge," is featured on Elmira Darvarova's CDs. Konstantin's opera transcriptions and original compositions will be published, and his work, "The Pride Suite," will have a pre-premiere as a choreographed art piece.



Florian Noack, a Belgian pianist born in 1990, discovered a whole new world of piano repertoire at a young age. In addition to studying the works of Chopin and Beethoven, Florian also delved into the compositions of Alkan, Medtner, and Lyapunov,

thanks to the influential book "Piano Music" by Guy

Sacre. Inspiration flowed from his love for Russian literature and his studies with pianist-composer Vassily Lobanov. Florian's piano transcriptions based on orchestral works by Tchaikovsky, Rachmaninov, and Rimsky-Korsakov caught the attention of esteemed musicians like Boris Berezovsky and Dmitri Bashkirov. Praised for his recordings, Florian received the ECHO Klassik Award "Emerging Artist of the Year 2015," the International Classical Music Award, the Octave de la Musique, and the Diapason d'Or of the Year 2017. Florian's virtuosity is recognized as a means to captivate audiences with his interpretative skills and programmatic innovation. His formative experiences include studying with Claudio Martinez-Mehner and attending Academy masterclasses with Ference Rados in Prussia Cove, Cornwall. Florian has succeeded in various international competitions, including the International Rachmaninoff, the International Robert Schumann, and the International Piano Competition Cologne. Through invitations from festivals and concert halls worldwide, Florian engages in meaningful collaborations with fellow musicians, conductors, and orchestras. He has released six well-received CDs featuring a diverse range of repertoire and his own piano transcriptions.

He joined the Fratres Trio in 2016 with violinist Fedor Rudin and saxophonist Hayrapet Arakelyan. Florian Noack is interested in merging jazz and classical repertoire from the 1920s and beyond. He tutors at the Musikhochschule in Cologne, teaches at the Miami Piano Festival Academy 2020, and regularly gives master classes.





Channon Lee is a prize-winning violinist known of for her success in international competitions. She has received top prizes and awards, including the Sendai Competition in Japan, the Queen Elisabeth Competition in Belgium, the Shanghai Isaac Stern Competition, the Naumburg Competition in New York City, and the Indianapolis Competition. Shannon has

performed solo with renowned orchestras such as the Tokyo Symphony, Antwerp Symphony, Belgian National Orchestra, and New York String Orchestra at Carnegie Hall. Shannon began playing the violin at the age of four and has studied with esteemed teachers such as Ann Grosshans, Paul Landefeld, and Jan Mark Sloman. She currently resides in the Netherlands, pursuing an artist certificate at the Conservatorium van Amsterdam.

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Nhinese pianist **Ying Li** won the First Prize at the 2021 Young Concert Artists Susan Wadsworth International Auditions. She has also received prestigious awards from competitions such as the Antonio Mormone International Prize,
